Coming in December



December 2 - Naomi Scheliesman, "Home: How Home and Place/Space Shape Who We Are and What We Learn."

Naomi has been the Arts Development Director for Springboard for the Arts since 2013. Naomi grew up in the small rural community of Fergus Falls, Minnesota; born into a family of laborers, which included farmers, nurses, seamstresses, bar owners and woodworkers, she started using her hands at an early age to play with tools and to create objects out of a variety of media.

During her growing up, her family frequently moved from home to home. She became accustomed to the cycle of moving, tearing down walls, building additions, the redecoration and personalization. It was through these frequent transitions that the importance of applying her ornamentation and aesthetic led to a sense of space that said "home." It was the disparate ornamentation of the décor of home, school and church that fostered in her an acute awareness of how different spaces were decorated and the types of ornamentation that signified the function of the space.

History and continuity play a large role in shaping Naomi's understanding of self and family. Illness and death have taken many family members and illness has affected the artist herself. It has been through caring for herself and family members that has led to an extensive knowledge of science and how that reconciles the psychology of illness and coping, while integrating the faith that one is raised with.

At Springboard for the Arts, Naomi leads the Hinge Arts at the Kirkbride residency program and teaches the Work of Art: Business Skills for Artists workshops. She has her BFA with an emphasis in sculpture from Minnesota State University Moorhead and an MFA from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. She has received a Fellowship from Ragdale and Kimmel Hardening Nelson Center for the Arts, was awarded 2nd place for Miami University Young Sculptors Competition for William and Dorothy Yeck Award, and was a LEAP finalist for Society of Contemporary Craft Award. She has traveled abroad to Italy, Scotland, Ireland, France, United Kingdom and Belize to study art and has done artist residencies at Vermont Studio Center, Kimmel Hardening Nelson Center for the arts, Ragadale and Hospitalfield Arts. Naomi currently serves on the Public Arts Commission for The City of Fergus Falls and is also a board member for the Fergus Falls Convention and Visitors Bureau. She continues her own

studio practice in Visual and Performing arts, collaborates with her 2-year-old daughter, Zara, and has shown nationally.

Notes from October Speakers/Events

November 4 - Fergus Falls Mayor, **Ben Schierer** was the featured speaker with his talk entitled:



"Shining Cities on the Prairie." Ben served on the FF City Council beginning in 2004 and as Mayor since 2016. He and his wife, Tessa have five children and own Union Pizza and Brewing. To begin, he read from Genesis 12:1-2 and Matthew 5:14. Richard Kagan had contacted him to speak and mimicking Richard requests, "it was more important to "be intellectual than inspirational." After he shared with

Richard his intellectual draft, Richard said, "yes, yes, yes but be more inspirational."

Before coming here, Ben reviewed the UU Principles and learned about UCU's history: established 1889 by Scandinavian immigrants; naming Kristopher Janson, Hans P. Bjorge, John Gronner, names familiar to UCU members. When he came upon a phrase used to describe this church, "light on the prairie," he knew he was on track with today's talk. "City upon a hill" was originally from John Winthrop's sermon he gave on the early pilgrim's ship voyage. The phrase was later quoted by John F. Kennedy and Ronald Reagan. It is surprising that we long for the "good ol' days of Ronald Reagan. It seems we are now in crisis and so we must act at the local level, in our churches, neighborhoods and on our own porches. We need to have deep conversations – hear each other and not jump to conclusions or judgment.

Ben, while on his regular jog, noticed but was unaware of the implications of a message of a billboard displaying a flag. He didn't realize the significance of that portrayal until reading Victoria Creek's letter to the paper. Without others telling us of their sensitivities, we cannot be educated to their perspectives, we cannot change and correct ourselves to be more sensitive.

John Adams in a letter to his wife, Abigail stated we "cannot "guarantee" the percepts of our constitution, but we can "deserve it." Have conversations because it is the right thing to do. Vote but talk to others on why you voted for what you did – vote as if white supremacy rallies are being held in our cities, believe that the worth and dignity of EVERY person is at stake. See the shining cities on the prairie and think and act with peace, liberty and justice for all.

"But in my mind, it was a tall proud city built on rocks stronger than oceans, windswept, Godblessed, and teeming with people of all kinds living in harmony and peace; a city with free ports that hummed with congress and creativity. And if there had to be city walls, the walls had doors and the doors were open to anyone with the will and the heart to get here. That's how I saw it and see it still.... And she's still a beacon, still a magnet for all who must have freedom, for all the pilgrims from all the lost places who are hurtling through the darkness, toward home." Ronald Reagan, Farewell Address, January 1989.

November 11 - Janell Miersch, Beth Monke, and Patty Shol presented a program about the Citizen's Climate Lobby (CCL). They recognize the connections between climate change, faith, and social justice, and have given this presentation to groups at their places of worship – Federated Church of FF, Bethlehem Lutheran Church of FF, and today, UCU.

A natural greenhouse effect helps the earth to maintain an 'average' temperature in which life is sustainable. The problem is that through the burning of coal, gas and oil, the amount of greenhouse gases has increased since the Industrial Revolution. In particular, carbon dioxide (CO2) levels have increased 43%, and methane (CH4) levels have doubled.

Some ask if these changes don't have natural causes. In fact, natural causes would probably have a cooling effect because:

- The sun is, in fact getting cooler.
- Changes in the earth's orbit should have a cooling effect.

To counter these changes and rising temperatures, we need to (rapidly) transition to greener energy sources. Climate change is not a 'special interest'; it is a human-interest issue.

The Citizen's Climate Lobby (CCL) is an international, non-partisan, nonprofit organization based on respect, admiration and gratitude and is solution focused. Its solution is a carbon fee and dividend program. Fees would be charged at sources where greenhouse gases are emitted – mines, wells, etc. The fee would start at \$10 per ton and would increase annually. The funds collected would be paid monthly directly to households (\$X per adult + 1/2X per child).

According to the REMI (Regional Economic Models, Inc.) study there is no economic argument against such a plan. Advantages include lower emissions due to increased costs; job creation as a greener economy grows; and decrease in health issues (asthma, etc.) It also predicts that this plan would decrease greenhouse gas emissions 31% over the next 10 years.

CCL encourages individuals to build political will for this plan by talking to congressional reps., publishing in media, doing outreach, educating ourselves and others, and reducing our own carbon footprints.

Opening/Closing Words

"We seem to have lost the wisdom of the indigenous people, which dictated that in any major decision, the first consideration was: How will this decision we're making today affect our people in the future?' These days decisions are made based on the bottom line." Jane Goodall

Albert Einstein said, "Problems cannot be solved at the same level of awareness that created them." For this reason, we need to bring conversation about our relationship with and our responsibilities toward Earth into the heart of our faith communities. A different level of awareness - a spiritual awareness - is critical.

November 18: Jane Smith, "Joining Together with Multiple Truths" referencing UU Principles 1,3, & 6. Jane received her Master's in Divinity from Meadville Lombard and is currently a chaplain working with teens with mental illness and addiction issues.

Two years ago, she participated at Standing Rock where there was an interfaith presence of multiple truths working together in common cause. We need to build cohesiveness and that requires establishing boundaries. Both truths may be correct. Important that "I love you, I see you, I hear you." We are one where we can journey together yet, honor the differences and connect with the multiple truths. Be cognizant of language – use "I" statements. Come whoever you are. Not any ONE person can, but a group can become collective strength.

We can accept each other but we cannot accept those beliefs or practices that are counter to our UU principles: racism, antisemitism, terrorism – whatever it is that deprives another person of their inherent worth.

People change with love. We oppose acts of hate but there can be bi-partisanship over inclusiveness, example – prison reform. Recognize our white privilege; people marginalized feel like "the other, the slave." The "accidently fortunate" vs. those facing obstacles because of race, religion, etc. We are one, because we journey together.

November 25 – Athena Kildegaard, "The Grace of Gratitude" referencing UU Principles 1 & 7.

Athena is the author of five books, the latest, *Course*. She is the recipient of various grants, has had her poems set to music, was a nominee for the Pushcart Prize and currently teaches at Morris U of M.

(According to her introduction) she says, "thanks to social media we're

good at "liking." Thumbs up for cats and goats and babies! Gratitude is surely a different thing-liking with gravitas. There's no grace to hitting (on Facebook) "Like," but there's grace in gratitude." Athena talked about how it is often hard to be grateful these days when the news is full of stories of tragic wildfires and immigrant bashing. Despite the news, though, we can set our tables and hearts with gratitude. There is no cost to saying thank you. Experiencing and expressing gratitude can entirely change our outlook. She relayed the story of her family, her father a practicing alcoholic when the family with assistance did an intervention. He resisted even as the family insisted, "get sober, or we'll leave you," until at last he said, "yes." It was a cold January day when they entered the library and when they came out, it seemed like spring had come – there was change from the frigid to the fruitful.

In old Scottish, "gratitude" was a noun meaning 'a gift'; the gift of being grateful. Athena described her husband as having the happiest classroom. His motto is to say "thank you" often.

Athena read several delightful poems: one by Joy Harjo, *Perhaps the World Ends Here* (at the kitchen table used over time for many purposes; *Relax* by Ellen Bass that expressed the sentiment of distressing events that may occur in our lives but with the ending sentiment of eating strawberries.

We set our tables and offer gratitude and we discover grace.

When asked about sources of books of poetry to give as gifts she suggested:

- 1. Gray Wolf press. She particularly recommended *Don't Call Us Dead*, by Danez Smith.
- 2. Milkweed press publications, such as *Things That Are* by Amy Leach.
- 3. Red Dragonfly press, such as author Freya Manferd.

This is an excellent opportunity for church members to make an impact on an issue they feel strongly about in the community around them. The deadline for grant applications is January 31, 2019.

Criteria for 'Empowerment Grant' requests:

- Must be proposed by Unitarian Church of Underwood (UCU) members.
- Must be compatible with the UCU mission/vision statement. (The Unitarian Church of Underwood is a welcoming community of diverse people who gather to reflect, to find refuge, spiritual renewal and intellectual growth, to improve our understanding of the world, to build bridges towards peace and understanding, and to improve lives and opportunities across our communities).
- Must address one of the seven Unitarian Universalist principles.
- Must be non-discriminatory.

- Projects will not provide direct services to individuals or families the project may help area charities and non-profits that provide direct services.
- Requests may be for total funding or may be for matching funds. Note: Matching fund requests will be given priority. The rationale for this criterion is to double the impact of UCU initiatives, and to encourage members to get involved with issues and work at raising funds. Example: The chili dinner raises \$1,000 for the senior nutrition program. This \$1,000 could be matched by an additional \$1,000, thus giving the nutrition program \$2,000.
- The project being funded must be under the direction of an approved, not for profit (501c-3) organization.
- Projects/groups that have not received previous funding will be given a higher priority for funding.
- All grant recipients must agree to/sign an 'Empowerment Grant' contract. This includes progress reports and final report as per contract.

The next funding cycle will be for twelve months. The application deadline for the next funding period is **January 31, 2019**. If you are interested in pursuing an 'Empowerment Grant' you need to fill out the application at the end of the Newsletter or pick up one at church. The application must include a timeline for your project and a specific budget for the cost of the project. Please make six copies of your application for review. It would also be a good idea to talk to a member of the 'grant committee', that will be accepting applications.

The committee will review all applications and recommend or not recommend project requests to the church board of directors. The review criteria are also included at the end of the Newsletter. Grant selections are determined in February-March, given Board approval in March with funds distributed sometime in April. What is the Annual Program Fund?

From the UUA's Office of Stewardship and Development

What is the Annual Program Fund?

Every UU congregation in our Association is asked to contribute a specific sum of money annually to the Annual Program Fund to support the congregations in our Association. The Annual Program Fund makes up the single largest source of funding for the work of the Unitarian Universalist Association. In turn, the UUA utilizes these funds to provide resources, programming and support to the congregations across the Association. Your giving makes this possible. Thank you!

In July of 2019, congregations in MidAmerica and the Districts of the Pacific Western Region will move to the New APF.

The New APF formula is different in two significant ways.

First, the New APF request supports both APF and what your congregation formerly contributed to your district and/or region. The New APF is a unified program, demonstrating that we are all one UUA. The New APF is also based upon a congregation's ability to pay, and it therefore is based on a congregation's certified expenditures rather than number of members. The New APF is a fair and equitable way for our congregations to both support and be supported.

The New APF formula asks for a contribution of 6.75% of your congregation's certified expenditures. There are built in adjustments to the formula for congregations in high wage rate areas (utilizing the national UUA Geo Index), or for congregations who have extremely high expenses per member

Note: Over the past years, Fair Share Assessment dues were \$85/certified member annually. This comprised well over 11% of UCU's annual operating budget.

UNITARIAN CHURCH OF UNDERWOOD BOARD OF DIRECTORS Approved MINUTES—OCTOBER 17, 2018, BOARD MEETING

Board members present: Tim Lanz, Connie Stigen, Bob Worner, John Miersch, Shannon Smith, Kris Warhol, Ron Roller, Dave Sanderson, and John Minge.

Board members absent: Darryl Booker.

Others in attendance: Administrative Consultant JoAnn Larson

The Meeting was called to order at 5:37 P.M. by Board President Kris Warhol.

- 1. The Meeting was opened with a reading "The Last Word" from "UU World".
- 2. Tim Lanz was welcomed as a new Board member.
- 3. Agenda: The proposed agenda for this meeting was approved. (Worner/Miersch)
- 4. Minutes of the previous meeting were approved. (Sanderson/Smith)

5. Administrative Consultant's Report: JoAnn Larson reported on the activities of the Church. She reported that "things were looking good". The new member welcome had recently taken place. The speaker schedule is filling out. Christmas events are being planned. On December 16, the children of the Church will present a program during the Sunday service.

6. Treasurer's Report: Ron Roller presented and commented on the Balance Sheet (as of September 30, 2018) and the "UU Common Endowment Funds. He explained his desire to move \$20,000 out of the savings account where it's earning hardly anything and into a CD at the Underwood Bank that would earn interest at the rate of 2.5% per annum without any early withdrawal penalty. A motion to that effect was passed. (Sanderson/Stigen) Ron then presented and commented on a Profit and Loss Statement through September 30, 2018. For the first six months of the current budget year, the Church's income has exceeded the budgeted amount. And for same period, the expenses are about \$2500 under the budgeted amount. Finally, Sverdrup Suites are doing pretty well from a budgeting point of view.

7. Stewardship Committee: Dave Sanderson reported on the activities of this Committee. It had a meeting earlier in September. There was some discussion of creating a committee of three people—the Treasurer/ Bookkeeper, the chairperson of the Finance Committee, and the chairperson of the Stewardship Committee—for future fundraising purposes. Its charge would be to determine and monitor the distribution of giving within the Church. (That is, to better understand giving patterns for future fundraising purposes.) After some discussion, It was determined that this can already be done and that, therefore, there was no need for this new committee.

8. Speakers Committee: JoAnn said that speaker scheduling was going well, that there would be no community Thanksgiving service, and that six services are scheduled for December (which is the first time that that number of services will have taken place in one month).

9. Adult Religious Education: John Minge and Bob Worner briefly discussed how things are going.

10. Kids Religious Education: Kris Warhol reported that this was going well and that a planning meeting was scheduled for October 21.

11. Membership Committee: John Miersch reported that there are four new Church members.

12. Communications Committee: There was no report from this Committee.

13. Sunday Service Coordinating Committee: JoAnn reported that this Committee had just met. Its next meeting will be in three months.

- 14. Celebrants: Bob briefly reported on this.
- 15. Empowerment Grants: Ron reported that he has begun to receive inquiries.

16. Community Events: Ron reported that the chili dinner revenues are being used to pay drivers for the local senior nutrition program.

17. Social Justice Committee: Kris reported that Stan Carignan (as Habitat for Humanity Executive Director) gave a medallion to the Church for its support of Habitat and a medallion to Tim Lanz for his considerable volunteering.

18. UU Groups: The Perham U Group will be preparing and serving a meal in Pelican Rapids.

19. Facilities Committee: A written report from Darryl Booker has been received. After some discussion, it was decided that the air quality issue would be referred to this Committee for further review and for its recommendation regarding future action, if any. The Board is to

hear back from this Committee at its December meeting. (Minge/Sanderson)20. Safety Committee: There was no report from this Committee.21. Sverdrup Suites: The cost of the replacement water heater has been paid. The amount that was paid was not known. There was some discussion regarding the need to make prompt repairs to the living units.

The next meeting is to be held on November 21, 2018, at 5:30 p.m. at Sverdrup Suites. Meeting adjourned at 6:50 p.m.
