Message from Board President, Norm Kolstad

Where to go from here?

Know yourself. That is good advice for organizations as well as individuals. For the Board of the Unitarian Church of Underwood, it has become our tacit mantra as we seek to map out a future that satisfies our mission, goals, and principles.

As the first step in this process, we have asked members and friends to complete a survey that will tell us about how we are perceived and what can we do to improve. The compiled results will be analyzed by the board and

used to create a course that will be the basis of board actions and for the annual membership meeting in April 2021.

In 2020 we experienced quite a change in how we operate. We learned that technology can be used to connect us when we cannot - or choose not - to meet in person. We also learned that racism may be a more formidable foe than we realized. And we recognize that our demographic is also shifting. These factors will need to be considered in drawing our plans for the future.

We recognize that our job is not to do church the way we always have, but to adapt church experiences and services to meet the needs of our members and friends. Standing still is not an option. *Norm Kolstad*

Unitarian Church of Underwood Viable Future

To date, thirty-five (35) UCU members and friends responded to the Viable Future Questionnaire. The compiled information informs us as to:

- Membership Composition
- Effect of COVID-19 Restrictions
- Member/friend Participation Levels
- Member/friend satisfaction with UCU
- Member/friend aspirations for UCU

In addition, 16 from the Board of Directors and others participated in the Intercultural Development Inventory administered by Victoria McWane-Creek. Information on the meaning of those findings will be presented at an upcoming Sunday service in January.

We will also hold some focus groups to further capture thoughts of members and friends as we refocus on the UCU mission, vision, and goals. Watch for further announcements.

Remembering

I am a poet, In search of words, Measures, and Metaphors, To resolve the enígma Of my tíme being. From "Time Being" by Luke Anderson (1937-2020)



Shortly after her partner Luke Anderson's death last February, longtime UCU member, Joanne Cress was contacted about the publishing of one of Luke's poems. The caller knew that Joanne was an artist and asked her permission to use it as well one of her paintings. Consequently, not only is Luke featured with the poem above, but the cover of *The Talking Stick, Volume 29* features Joanne's painting entitled "Missing You." The watercolor was painted by Joanne from a photograph she'd taken of Luke walking down a pathway while they resided in California.

Many will remember as Diane Johnson relays "that Luke Anderson was involved in the founding of the Fergus Falls Writers Group and upon the board of the Lake Region Writers Network which put on a

yearly writers conference at the college in Fergus Falls. He also started a Underwood Unitarian writers group, which met regularly before Sunday services, utilizing 'prompts' and instigating writing exercises, with the goal of providing material for services, particularly as a means of exploring and initiating thought on our Principles and Purposes."

The Talking Stick referenced is a publication of the nonprofit organization, The Jackpine Writers' Bloc, Inc. It is a Minnesota collaboration of poetry, creative nonfiction and fiction with cash prizes awarded in each category. The goal of The Jackpine Writers' Bloc is simple - to encourage and publish Minnesota writers. Everyone published in this book, and all who worked to see it come to print, have a strong connection to Minnesota. These are writers who know

Unitarian Church of Underwood Empowerment Grant Application Time! Applications Due January 31, 2021

From Kayak building for Boys & Girls Club, to POPS @ the Farmers Market to Shan Schools in Thailand, over \$100,000 has been distributed in Empowerment Grants by UCU since 2007. The Unitarian Church of Underwood is pleased to offer funding once again for distribution of the 2020-21 Empowerment Grants. These grants are made to encourage church members to develop projects that will have a positive effect on our communities at large. These projects may be related to any number of social or environmental issues, including poverty, education, ecology, alternative energy, & nutrition. The projects may be of varying time and cost, but all will be initiated and managed by the requesting applicant(s). This is an excellent opportunity for church members to make an impact on an issue they feel strongly about in the community around them. The deadline for grant applications is January 31, 2021.

Criteria for 'Empowerment Grant' requests:

- Must be proposed by Unitarian Church of Underwood (UCU) members.
- Must be compatible with the UCU mission/vision statement. (The Unitarian Church of Underwood is a welcoming community of diverse people who gather to reflect, to find refuge, spiritual renewal and intellectual growth, to improve our understanding of the world, to build bridges towards peace and understanding, and to improve lives and opportunities across our communities).
- Must address one of the seven Unitarian Universalist principles.
- Must be non-discriminatory.
- Projects will not provide direct services to individuals or families the project may help area charities and non-profits that provide direct services.
- The project being funded must be under the direction of an approved, not for profit (501c-3) organization.
- Projects/groups that have not received previous funding will be given a higher priority for funding.
- All grant recipients must agree to/sign an 'Empowerment Grant' contract. This includes progress reports and final report as per contract.

The next funding cycle will be for twelve months. The application deadline for the next funding period is January 31, 2021.

OR print the application at the end of the newsletter and mail to: Unitarian Church of Underwood, PO Box 58, Underwood, MN 56587, Attn: Empowerment Grants.

The application must include the amount requested, a timeline for your project and a specific budget for the cost of the project. It would also be a good idea to talk to a member of the grant committee that will be accepting applications. Selection Team members are: Ron Roller, Amy Beckman, Deb Ferguson, and Connie Stigen.

The committee will review all applications and recommend or not recommend project requests to the church board of directors. Grant selections are determined in February-March, given Board approval in March, with contracts to be signed and returned promptly, and funds distributed upon receipt of the signed contract.

Dear Unitarian Church of Underwood,

I send you my deep care in this time of changing seasons and tumultuous days. I continue to hold all of you in my prayers—as you lead your communities in these fraught times.

While there is very hopeful news about the efficacy of new coronavirus vaccines, there is still cause for serious concern. Given the dramatic surge in cases, we reiterate our recommendation for congregations to plan to gather virtually through May 2021. We have made some updates to our <u>Guidance on Gathering</u>, including revised prevention measures and how decisions can be guided by our values.

As the holiday season approaches, I feel the grief of not being able to physically be with family and friends. While the longing to be together is real, so too is the way inperson gatherings increase risk. This pandemic is a vivid reminder that our decisions impact those around us—not only our loved ones, but those most vulnerable, including weary healthcare and essential workers. This is why we continue to lean into our values of collective care and interdependence.

The way that Unitarian Universalists are living our values is my greatest source of hope at this moment. Whether we are adapting to safely minister to one another or responding to the urgent demands of our world, UUs everywhere are showing up and making a difference.

I continue to celebrate joyfully everyone who voted in this critical election and all who overcame the extreme voter suppression. Black, Latinx, and Indigenous people were especially targeted, but they still made their voices heard. Across the country, UUs showed up to protect the integrity of the electoral process, as election workers, poll monitors and election defenders. UU the Vote and local grassroots partners including in contested states like Wisconsin, Pennsylvania, Arizona and Georgia helped mobilize historic voter turnout!

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Even as we recognize the scope of our work, I am aware of how incredibly difficult these last four years have been. And the election cycle is still laden with fraudulent claims. The President is spreading pernicious misinformation that is dangerous to our democracy. His thwarted attempts to discount votes in Detroit, Philadelphia, Atlanta and Milwaukee amount to trying to steal the electoral count and are deeply rooted in anti-Black racism. <u>Election Defenders</u> is a core organization to volunteer with to help protect the vote in states around the country, including important virtual actions.

We must not let these corrupt efforts overshadow the fact that the election results are a win for democracy and the will of the people. This is a time to remember our collective resilience and ability to protect each other, to defend democracy, and to organize unfailingly for justice, equity and dignity.

As we anticipate the holiday season and create new ways to connect and celebrate

this time, let's remember the joy and love present in our hearts and in our communities. Let us also make space for grief and honor the memories of those who have passed away this year. May we feel the unseen but real threads that binds us all. We are not alone. We are powerful. Our communities are powerful. And we belong to each other.

In this season, may you find restorative space to lean into what you love and what makes you feel connected. May we find strength in our faith, and in the foundation of our families, friends and the people who came before us. While there is much work ahead, may we also make room to breathe and rest, and time to connect with our community and those we love.

The meeting was called to order by President, Norm Kolstad at 6:33 p.m.

The Board Agenda was approved with a reorder of topics so Mary Worner could present first on the David Pyle assessment information (Ron Roller/John Minge).

The Board Minutes of August 19, 2020 were approved as published (John Minge/Amy Beckman.

Reports:

<u>Practices of Board Leadership:</u> Mary Worner continued sharing highlights on the Practices of Board Leadership, as it was presented by Rev. David Pyle, "...board's task to assess the health and vitality of the congregation" by determining where we have been, the wholeness of the congregation and the Board's own relationships. This is often a neglected practice that ignores the failures and harms. Doing an assessment broadens the Board's view. (See full notes below.)

<u>Treasurer's Report:</u> Treasurer Ron Roller presented the financial report. Investment with UUA, though continuously fluctuating, show a 10% gain. September collections primarily via Automatic Funds Transfer were \$1906.67 compared to the \$3402.58 monthly collections projected. Ron expects some large collections in January what with the tax advantages to contributors. The UCU website platform does not allow the Givelify application so an alternate online application will be researched. With the decreased expenses, there is \$6800 to the good. Sverdrup rentals continue as regular income. Re: Empowerment Grants: \$1200 was returned; \$200 is pending due to an unsigned contract; \$2500 expected to be returned for the cancelled Nibi Walk. Disposition of these funds will be determined later. Re: Bookkeeper Terms - Tere Mann is satisfied with the \$50/month paid her for bookkeeping services. The full financial reports are available on Google Suites shared drive.

<u>Congregational Administrator's Report:</u> Bonnie Graham reported that she has been working with Melody Shores on implementation of Google Suites. With her queries to the Board, she learned more about additional training needed. In addition, Bonnie noted the UUA message that she'd forwarded the Board about taking protections following the election as many UU churches have been in the centers of political action. Discussion ensued on how UCU wants to be seen by the community and if members/friends will need anything post-election time that the church might provide.yt The matter was referred to the Social Justice Group.

<u>Records Committee</u>: Norm Kolstad, Committee Chair reported that work for record keeping continues with the implementation of Google Suites, review of the Articles and By-laws, and the

Policy and Procedures Manual. It is expected that the Article and By-laws will be ready for presentation to the membership at the next Annual Meeting.

Facility:

Norm Kolstad reported that the suggestion has been made to change the name of the Facilities Committee to "Buildings and Grounds" Committee, thus avoiding confusion between the name of the Committee and the mission of Facility (Program, Community Outreach, Facility). There was no objection to the name change and the committee will be notified accordingly. There was also a request, since retracted, to use Sverdrup Suite #300 for isolation purposes. It was determined that the matter of use/non-use of Sverdrup Suites for purposes of this type be referred to the Safety and Buildings and Grounds Committees for development of consistent and equitable policies.

Membership Committee:

Re: Circle of Calls- most Board members had overlooked the request to be part of the group of callers to members and friends for "circle of care" calls. Mary Anderson was asked to resend the call list. Re: Spiritual Companioning – the Membership Committee with Ellen Eastby determined that Ellen will send out a personal email to inform and invite members/friends to participate in this new offering. It is expected that Ellen will work further with the Celebrants to develop the role of Spiritual Companion.

Program Coordination:

Program Coordinator Mary Worner reported the status of the Children's Religious Education Program wherein, RE Lead, Kris Warhol has been making weekly contacts to 10 children including COVID safety and fun activity suggestions. Other members are involved in ideas for including the children in UCU activities.

Community Outreach:

Community Outreach Co-Coordinator Amy Beckman reported on the many social justice activities underway that include: Administration of the Intercultural Development Inventory (do by October 27, debriefing October 28); Book discussion on racism that led to a Facebook discussion group on Confronting Racism in West Central MN; upcoming film festival with previewing and discussion groups to follow; member participation in North MUUSJA's webinar offerings on Being a Good Relative. There was no objection to individual's sharing information on these and other social justice activities.

Mary Anderson then reported that this group would prefer to act as an "Interest Group" rather than as a Committee. An Interest Group would be defined as "individuals working together on interest and action areas that meet the UU Principles and UCU mission and with their efforts, providing other UCU members and friends opportunities to at-will creatively and actively engage." Activity communication and leadership would be shared among and between the group members. Discussion ensued as to whether a "committee" is the designated means of conducting UCU business to carry out its mission. The matter was deferred for further deliberation.

Unfinished Business:

Determination and finalization of Bookkeeper terms was deferred to the Executive Team to complete.

<u>Viable Futures Initiative</u> - Mary Anderson laid out a plan for input from and assessment of the membership for further planning and mission and visioning purposes.

- 1. IDI Invitations sent 10/15/20 to Board, SJ Interest Group, Committee Chairs.
- 2. Announcements to Membership via newsletter and church announcements.
- 3. Administration of IDI to leadership 10/20-27 with debrief 10/28.
- 4. Questionnaire to members 11/1 online survey and mailed to non-email users, request return by Nov 20.
- 5. Focus groups for discussion of ideas/options early December.
- 6. Leadership retreat to assess information gathered to determine mission refocus mission statement revision (January).
- 7. Prepare findings and recommendations for Board approval (February).
- 8. Incorporation into Strategic Plan 2021-22 Annual Goals and Objectives.
- 9. Viable Futures Report April Annual Meeting of the Membership.
- 10. On-going implementation across program lines

The Board agreed that the plan proceed.

<u>New Business:</u> There were no items of new business.

Addendum: Practices of Board Leadership 5 - Planning for the Future

• Strategic Planning is explicitly naming the congregations intentions to fulfill the mission over the short term of 3-5 years

• Long Range Planning is the congregation's intentions to fulfill the vision over the next 5-25 years

When I was teaching the Five Strategic Board Tasks, I framed this practice as "Strategic Planning", but I learned from engaging with congregations and leaders over the years that not only was that phrase so overlain with experiences people have from their professional lives, it was one of the primary ways that we were disempowering the Religious Leadership of

congregational lay-leaders. And so, while strategic planning techniques may be helpful in fulfilling the Board Leadership Practice of Planning for the Future, the practice itself is much broader than Strategic Planning. Remember, most of the ideas of Strategic Planning that we bring into our congregations come from the corporate world, where the goal that you are trying to achieve is different than the transformation and relationships that we are trying to build in religious community, and bring with them often unacknowledged patterns of white supremacy culture cloaked as "efficiency" and "Professionalism."

Instead, what I mean by this practice is that it is the role of the congregational Governing Board, having developed a deep understanding of the living mission and vision of the congregation, having a understanding of the sustainable resources of the congregation, having looked closely at the congregation's ministries and ad ministries and seen what is possible, to then chart a course of the congregation's future for the continued fulfillment of the congregation's mission and vision.

I must admit that, for myself, I have almost become agnostic about how a congregation fulfills this Practice of Board Leadership. I think it is different in every congregation. I have seen some congregations develop highly detailed Strategic Plans that took a task force six months of work and then successfully implement that plan. And I have seen congregations that have just set a few new goals each year, with an idea of a future set of goals they want to achieve a few years out meet those goals and even exceed them. I, myself and personally attached to teaching congregations what I call the "3 Year Rolling" strategic planning process as an ongoing aspect of the work of the Board.

So, this practice is more about an attitude than it is about a particular way to do it. There are tons of resources on planning for churches out there, in the Leader Lab and beyond. But this practice is really about a congregational governing Board developing practices that draw its vision towards the future and looks for ways to fulfill the mission and vision of the congregation. So much draws our attention to the present and the past in congregational leadership that it takes intentional effort to look towards the future. The key to this Practice of Board Leadership is that the Board maintains its focus on fulfilling the mission and building the vision of the church, and is intentionally planning the steps that will get the congregation and our world there.
