Notes from February Speakers



February 4, 2018 - Shannon Smith's talk was titled **"The Heart is the Last Frontier."** Here are some excerpts:

"People can perceive the world differently by using their mind or using their hearts; through their thoughts or through their emotions. As a western culture, we have gotten very good at knowing the world through rational, linear thinking. But knowing the world through our hearts and holistic feeling does not come naturally for many of us. The changes introduced to us by ideas such as 'follow your heart', non-dual thinking, and spiritual healing are revolutionary for many."

- "Learning to know the world from your heart is not an easy shift...it is a change of vista and viewpoint."
- "One interesting area of research is led by a group of noetic scientists, who study how beliefs, thoughts, and intentions affect the physical world. This group believes that the heart plays the important role of synchronizing many systems and states of our body, integrating the heart and mind. "The heart is the center of our body intelligence, not the mind."
- "Opening your heart" has meanings on many different levels:
 - 1. Listening to your heart and emotions.
 - 2. Listening to information that comes to you through emotional intuition.
 - 3. Heart chakra and the flow of energy through our body
 - 4. Establishing a heart link to our divine higher power; sharing love, gratitude, peace, wisdom.

How can we do this? Through contemplative prayer and meditation. "Contemplation is a positive choosing of the deep, shining, and enduring divine mysteries that are hidden beneath the too-easy formulas. It is not fast food religion, but slow and healthy nutrition."

Through shifting to a heart centered focus, we can develop compassion, and maybe save ourselves from self-destruction.

February 11 - Stan Carignan facilitated a panel discussion "Why I am UU: We are a Pilgrim People, a Pilgrim Church" with long-time UUers: Tere Mann, John Miersch and Florance Thompson.









Florance Thompson

Stan Carignan Florance's religious background is "Norwegian." Both Tere and John grew up Lutheran. John became skeptical at a very young age. It was when he and Janell had children that they looked for a religious foundation for their growing children and found UU in Milwaukee. It was when Tere went to college and took World Religions that she learned there were other religions and many/most had the same core truths.

It was not so much one epiphany but a series of discoveries that led each to Unitarian Universalism. Florance grew up with few restraints but it was her love of math and physics that provided truths and honesty. She established a Sunday school in her home to provide other children and her children a religious foundation. Through parent participation, that evolved into the Fargo/Moorhead UU.

John felt that raising kids in a large metropolitan area gave him and his children opportunities to explore various religions and cultures. **Tere** became increasingly involved with earth traditions and original pagan practices, noting how some of those rituals were incorporated into world religious practices.

Belonging to the Unitarian Church of Underwood provides **Florance**, who liked fairy tales, music and dance; a sense of love, care, kindness, fun. Tere appreciates the welcoming found at UCU – that the doors are open to all; that there is an affirmation of ritual; that there is an acknowledgement that there is more than one way. John also appreciates UCU's welcoming of everybody, acceptance whether you are a professed believer or a non-believer; the humor and the emphasis on social justice.



February 18 – Adam Martin, Founder of F5 Project and F5 Venture Partners. Adam Martin's talk was titled **"The F5 Project,"** a 501(c)3 founded by Adam to help released felons transition into living in the community. When released, felons are usually given little support and guidance. He equated this to playing a video game for the first time and beginning on level 45.

Adam shared the story of his life. Growing up, he was frequently in trouble and school was difficult. (He attended Battle Lake High School). Beginning at age 18, he was convicted for and served sentences for crimes such as stealing cars and burglary, a five-time felon. Each time he got out, he would get a job (low paying), but he couldn't get housing. He slept on friends' couches, in homeless shelters, etc.

One day, he "woke up." (He has no explanation for why that day). He decided to begin to redirect his efforts from a life of craziness to getting his life together. A friend let him stay at his house, and helped him get a steady sales job with a company that took a chance on him and gave him the support he needed. As his life progressed, he started to help other released felons get their lives together. Eventually, he quit his sales job and developed the F5 project.

The project currently runs 7 houses, with 31 residents. Most are in the FM area; one is in Bismarck. People live at the houses, and 97% are employed (guided by the other residents and by the project). While the national recidivism rate is 70%, out of the last 100 residents of F5, only 7 have been recommitted to prison.

Adam later explained the double significance of F5. The "f5" key on a keyboard is the "refresh" key. It is also related to the fact that Adam has served time for 5 felons.

Several take-aways:

- Anyone who is breathing is valuable.
- The goal of the project is to help everyone achieve independence.
- Treat people like people without expectations.
- Help yourself by helping others.
- Mentorship is key.
- "Grace" happens.
- Safe housing is a #1 need. After having safe housing, employment can follow and lead to the person's success.
- Meet the person where they are at.
- Success is a journey it takes time.
- When grace is extended to someone, it is more powerful than heroin.
- Participants in the program are beginning to go into prisons to speak about the program.
- Prisoners can accept the empathy that former prisoners can offer.
- There is growing interest in ND and around the nation to offer services like the F5 Project.

Mr. Minnesota, Classic Guitar Built **By Steve Berg**



UCU Mission: The Unitarian Church of Underwood is a welcoming community of diverse people where our celebration of life and common search for meaning bind us together.

The Unitarian Church of Underwood, founded in 1889, has now been in existence for 129 years. Our history ranges from a small group of individuals with common cause to a more leader centered organization governed by a Board of Directors with lay volunteers primarily responsible for all the operational duties. The Board of Directors uses the authority of the UCU By-laws and the direction of the Strategic Plan to address and meet the mission of UCU. We are currently in process of developing the 3rd of our 5-year Strategic Plans, the first having been developed in 2008.

In February we conducted a series of focus groups to gather input on what we want/expect UCU to look like during and at the end of the next five years (2018-2023). We are also seeking input through a questionnaire to members. Information gathered will be incorporated into a Strategic Plan document to be approved by the Board and the membership.

Participate in New Member Orientation (February 27 and March 11) and New Member Welcoming March 4, 2018

Those who have recently signed the Membership Book or are interested in signing the book to become a UCU member will be officially welcomed March 4, 2018 at Sunday services. Two new members met at John & Janell Miersch's February 27 for a light supper and the one-hour New Member Orientation session. For those who missed or are interested, there will be another orientation session at church **March 11** following Sunday service.

The UCU Policy Statement #2 Article II Definitions B. states that: "A voting member is one who has signed the membership book and completed any of the following: has participated in an activity of the congregation in the past year, has made a recorded financial contribution since the beginning of the fiscal year, or expresses verbally, or in writing, a desire to remain a member."

We, like other UU Fellowships, have voting members; others who though not voting members, attend regularly or come for our featured speakers or other offerings; some who consider themselves members but are unable to participate; and some who come sometimes as visitors. We welcome everyone: "no single belief includes us here, no disbelief excludes us."



UCU Board Certifies 62 members for UUA Fair Share Assessment

Each UU church is expected to pay annually their Fair Share Assessment (annual dues) to the Unitarian Universalist Association (\$60/year/certified member) and the UU MidAmerica Region (\$25/year/certified member).

Under UUA, each congregation defines for themselves, "certified member." In consideration that a large part of our budget goes to the fair share assessment for each congregation, a few years ago the Membership Committee with Board approval established the criteria that we certify one member per household. Voting members must meet

the UUA by-laws requirements: (signed the membership book, over 16 years of age, participates annually in one or more events, makes financial contribution and wishes to be considered a member). Each certified member receives a copy of the UU World Magazine. One of the reasons we settled on this definition is we didn't see the need to have two or more magazines come to each household. We also wished to keep our dues within a manageable level of our operating budget.

For record keeping purposes, the Membership Committee maintains two lists: Voting Members list (individual meets voting member criteria) and Contact List (voting members + members we may or may not have seen in a while, plus other friends/visitors). Ellen Eastby also maintains an email mailing list that probably includes all these, plus others. We also keep on file, previous year's voting member and contact lists.

With the certification of 62 members, our Fair Share Assessment to UUA for FY 2018 will equal \$5270.00, a significant percentage of our annual operating budget. When we count individual voting members, we have 86. Members who meet the voting member criteria are eligible to vote on congregational decisions at the annual meeting in April.

In addition to those 86, we have 13 members of whom we are unsure of their status - moved, long term absence, etc. We have sent each of these individuals, a letter asking them to clarify their desired UCU membership status. We are not including them in this year's count pending their response. If they respond that they want to continue to be considered an active, voting member, we will continue them on the voting member roster and count them next year. If they no longer consider themselves an active, voting member, we will still include their name and contact information on the contact roster (active and inactive members/friends).

Last year we certified 64 members and counted 88 individual members. That included the 13 to whom we are sending the status letters in lieu of just counting them and paying those additional dues. Since last year, we've added 17 new members (all now actively participating)

and lost 3 beloved members. These new members account now for over 20% of our total individual members! "Households" becomes kind of a moving target as families move together or separate and that may account for any discrepancies you otherwise note.

Because we have faithfully paid our annual Fair Share Assessment over many years, we are considered by UUA, an Honor Congregation.

Friend's Passing


